GoGo Green students and families helped clean up Old Airport Beach Park last weekend. Volunteers removed a whole truckload of rubbish from the shoreline. Pollution included a significant amount of marine debris - large plastic pipes, crates, and shards along with microplastics that washed up after last week's big storm.

GoGo Green volunteers also worked with two local girl scout troops to create a mural made from hundreds of plastic lids removed from Kamilo Beach. The lids were collected by Hawaii Wildlife Fund who worked with local artists to design a mural of a turtle.

Kamilo Beach is one of the most polluted beaches in the world located on South Point. Debris from the Great Pacific Garbage Patch washes up on the isolated area; almost 300 tons of debris has been removed since 2008. The mural employs over 1500 multi-colored lids and will be on display at the Kona Brewers Festival. The turtle mural will educate festival-goers about Kamilo Beach, ocean pollution, and its threat to marine life.


