Team Building Elementary Edition

We were excited to start our school year off together with a focus on building community, relationships and a sense of "team" through fun, COVID-safe activities that focused on working together to achieve a common goal, negotiating, having fun in a team-centered effort, getting to know each other and establishing an atmosphere of community. Classrooms worked together across grade levels to complete challenges that required students work together on games such as our "Holey Sheets" game where students navigated a tennis ball across a sheet full of holes - creating games of "aiming" for the holes like you would do on a pool table or "avoiding" the holes to keep the ball "alive".

In our warm summer weather, all of our team building games were played outdoors - taking advantage of the sunshine, grassy areas and cool breeze ventilation. Water relays were a big hit!!! How much water can your team transfer to a bucket from a single sponge? Communication is a big part in being an effective team member. The fruit loops game (students did not eat the fruit loops they were manipulating), focused on ways to communicate with a teammate to create a pattern, design or sorting strategy. Some teams focused on non-verbal communication, some focused-on communication tools that were effective "even" with masks on, some focused on using specific and detailed instructions: ALL in an effort to recognize that effective teamwork is based on effective communication.

Finally, THE PIPELINE. Each group member plays an important role in creating the desired outcome of a team effort. Using small sections of pipe, students on a team needed to determine spacing and speed, cooperate and negotiate as they worked towards moving a ball from one location to the next.

Our campus is alive with students who are getting to know each other. We're learning each other's names and working in situations where we need to help each other achieve a common goal. We are a community and we need to each do our part to create a fun, learning environment.

On our middle school campus - team building took the form of getting to know each other and working together to define fun, safe ways to enjoy learning together. The culminating event was in line with the Summer Olympics - an Innovations-Style Team Building Olympics. Students worked in "country teams" to compete in various Olympic-like events with a game like twist.


